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Put simply, a punctuation mark (or punctuation point in American English) is a mark used in writing to organise sentences and clarify meaning. It's easy to assume that they have been around as long as the letters they corral, but that is not the case.

The comma might be the most troublesome punctuation mark. This is largely due to the many different ways the comma is used. Sometimes, the comma indicates a pause that would occur if the sentence were spoken aloud. Other times, the comma separates grammatical components of the sentence.

Contractions (e.g., let's, don't, couldn't, it's, she's) have a bad reputation. Many argue that they have no place at all in formal writing. You should, of course, observe your publisher's or instructor's requirements.

The standard English punctuation is as follows: period, comma,

Comma ,

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Punctuation (or sometimes interpunction) is the use of spacing, conventional signs (called punctuation marks), and certain typographical devices as aids to the understanding and correct reading of written text, whether read silently or aloud. Another description is, "It is the practice action or system of inserting points or other small marks into texts in order to aid interpretation; division ...

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The most common punctuation marks in English are: capital letters and full stops, question marks, commas, colons and semi-colons, exclamation marks and quotation marks. In speaking, we use pauses and the pitch of the voice to make what we say clear.
